NEW TOURISM AWARENESS CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED

esidents of Castara will benefit from a new training initiative aimed at educating Tobagonians about the opportunities they can derive from the island's tourism sector. The Tourism Awareness and Education Programme is being put on by the Product Development Unit of the Division of Tourism and Transportation (DOTT). It will run alongside the Division's community tourism programme, which was launched last week.
