TRHA: NO TRUTH TO HARVESTING CLAIMS

"Misleading and damaging" is how the Tobago Regional Health Authority has described the suggestion that there is an organ harvesting ring on the island.

The Authority has unequivocally dismissed the idea, first presented to the media by the political party Tobago Forwards.

In contrast, TRHA medical chief of staff Dr. Nathaniel confirmed Duke the Tobago medical system is not even equipped to harvest organs. This process is done by ISO certified USbased company International Sight Restoration, which must go through a rigorous process according to international standards before it can harvest corneas and supply them to a surgeon.

Tobago has so far had nine corneal surgeries done in 2015, all successful. It was also suggested that the medical team may have been "incentivised". However, Dr. Duke revealed that Dr. Deo Singh, the main surgeon who performs the implants, has done all nine in Tobago without charge. With the surgeries costing \$70,000 per eye in Trinidad and Tobago, it means TRHA the has saved "close to \$1 million", Dr. Duke said.

The TRHA said it "has no wish to be drawn into any political agendas by any political entities and politician", and added that its mandate is to "provide quality medical services to the people of Tobago". The Authority said it is open to addressing any "legitimate concerns" raised that impact the TRHA. It dismissed the Tobago Forwards as making it up as they go along.

GREATER FOCUS ON DEVELOPING FAMILIES

reater emphasis will be placed on supporting **Tobago's** families, with the Family Development Programme. It's for the public and families; they matter, and we believe that if we put this mechanism in place it will be for families to cash in on it."

LAPTOP KIOSKS LAUNCHED AT SCARBOROUGH LIBRARY

obago is enjoying another technological first-automated laptop kiosks. The two kiosks officially were launched at the Scarborough Library Facility on Monday (May 18, 2015), the first time such technology is being used in the Caribbean. This follows the opening of the state-of-the-art library facility in February.

The service was developed and installed by USbased company LaptopsAnytime. The kiosks not only dispense the computers for the use of patrons at the library; they can each also store, recharge and wipe clean six laptops as well.

According to Head of Tobago Library Services Helen Johnson, the service is in keeping with the library's mandate to lead the way in cutting edge library technology.

"We aim to remove barriers between technology and users and the launch of these kiosks are a result of our continued efforts to ensure that this goal is realised," Johnson said.
