WILLIAMS PRAISES ROXBOROUGH POLICE YOUTH CLUB

cting Commissioner of Police Stephen Williams show-Lered praises on Roxborough Youth Club on Sunday (May 25) during its 25th anniversary celebrations, describing it as a model for other organisations to follow.

The Trinidad and Tobago top cop said: "From a policing perspective we concentrate on areas with the highest number of crimes and we speak about Scarborough, Old Grange, Crown Point.

"I am sure the (club's) work with young people, 25 years of investment, would have seen young persons being shaped and sent in the right direction."

Collis Hazel, who founded the club. recounted some of the changes at the organisation.

"After 25 years of triumph and consistent meaningful activity that has impacted the lives and livelihood of 22 per cent of the population, the Roxborough Police Youth Club must justifiably be proud," Hazel said.

"In fact, this organisation can now be perceived as not only a Police Youth Club but rather (as having) an organisation status—as an entrepreneur, a skills bank, an icon among services organisations in the country, and even the region."

LOCAL GROUPS FOR UNDP KNOWLEDGE FAIR

ive local environmental groups will be part of the United Nations Development Programme's Knowledge Fair in Trinidad on Thursday and Friday (May 28-29).

The groups are the Parlatuvier Village Council, Environment Tobago, the South East Marine Protected Area (SEMPA), the North East Sea Turtles (NEST) organisation and the Environmental Research Institute Charlotteville (ERIC). The groups are being funded by the United Nations' Global Environment Facility (GEF) Programme. Former chairperson of the GEF steering committee Grace Talma said the fund will assist communities in developing and implementing projects that support environmental sustainability.

Talma added: "We are ensuring that (the environmental groups in the region) come together to

share and showcase what they've been doing, as well as network with other key people in the particular area of environment protection.

"Some would be lecturers, some would be best practices who have carried out a number of projects, not only locally but regionally and they can get into workshops and learn a lot from the rest of the world."
