SKANDALUS REIGNS FOR CARNIVAL 2016

Skandalus repeated as Band of the Year in the Senior Parade of the Bands Scarborough 2016 Carnival celebrations.

The band, led by Lindy Davidson and Nelsia Ashby, won for their presentation "Rome The Empire", scoring 1294 points. Marcus Des Vignes and Eldez and Associates were second with 1287 for "Art of War", while Stoute Next Generation, led by Candice Chang-Sandy, was third (1270 points) with "Day and Night".

Skandalus was also the top Large Band, with Stoute Next Generation second, and Lue-Ann Melville Associates ("Portrait of Dancers") third.

Eldez and Associates comfortably won the Medium Band category, with Gems City (Nicole Edmund-Darlington) second for "Let's Dance" and Lindley Melville and Associates were third for "Birds of a Feather". Lenn Topin and Minstrels of Tobago celebrated the Small Band category win after presenting "Excerpts of Minstrels of Tobago through the Years". Happy Lost Sailors (Robert Marshall and George Leacock) and Astra Winchester Creations (Astra Winchester).

In Roxborough, Skandalus also prevailed in the Large Band category, with Stoute Next Generation second.

Lindley Melville and Associates were the best Medium band with "Birds of a Feather, and JD Fantasy won the Small Band category for "My Ranger – Tale of the Desert Traveller".

Carnival in Crown Point saw a significant improvement, with a seventy-five percent increase in participation. The overall band of the Year in Crown Point was Fog Angels with their presentation, "Fogalicious".

Tobago Carnival Committee chairman Winston Gordon says Tobago had a relatively good Carnival 2016, and singled out Pan Trinbago Tobago Region president Marie Toby for the overall performances of the Tobago bands. This year, an unprecedented 14 bands made it to national finals.
