4.91B BUDGET FOR 2018

obago's budget proposal for the 2017-2018 financial year is \$4.91 billion.


This was revealed in this morning's (June 22, 2017) 2018 Tobago House of Assembly Budget Statement, delivered by Secretary of Finance and the Economy Joel Jack, who is also Deputy Chief Secretary.

The figure comprises proposed recurrent expenditure of \$3.2 billion and \$1.71 billion in development expenditure, and represents a decrease of roughly \$352 million from last year's request.

The major development projects highlighted in the presentation include phase III of the Fort King George Heritage Park project, at a cost of \$6.1 million; the upgrade of Sanctuary Resort (\$50M) and Manta Lodge (\$8.3M); infrastructural work at Pigeon Point (\$9.1M); and construction of cruise ship berths (\$2M).

Other major projects include: the Agricultural Access Roads Programme (\$80M); development of an Agro-Park at Friendship Estate (\$10M); improvement of beaches and landing facilities (\$10 million); improvement of the Northside Road improvements to (\$12.5M) and primary schools (\$26.7M).

Work is also earmarked for Tobago's

special needs schools, the Happy Haven School (\$10M) and the School for the Deaf and Hearing Impaired (\$10.5M). There is a request for URP (\$77.2M) and the Community Environmental Protection and Enhancement Programme

(\$54M). Jack also reported "off budget" expenditure items, including the construction of the new terminal at the ANR Robinson International Airport, the construction of the Old Grange and Roxborough Police Stations, construction of a desalination plant at the Cove Eco-Industrial and Business Park (CEIBP); and the expansion of the power generation plant at Cove.
