## SPORT POLICY **REVIEW SET** FOR NEXT WEEK

he Division of Education, Youth Affairs and Sport will collaborate with the Ministry of Sport at next week's Stakeholders Consultation, aimed at reviewing the 2008 draft Tobago Sport Policy.

The session, which will take place from August 27-28, 2025 at the Lowlands Community Centre from 9 a.m. each day, will be spearheaded by the Ministry's senior legal officer, Tyrone Marcus and will include representatives from the Division's Department of Sport.

The review will discuss the current landscape of sport on the island, and look at different models used in the wider region, as well as internationally.

It will also examine opportunities for partnering with external stakeholders, including sport tourism, and the role of business in local sport. Other issues, such as anti-doping, dispute resolution, gender issues and the differently abled, as well as child protection are also on the schedule as the Division looks toward the future for sport on the island.

## **DEYAS PRAISES NATIONAL YOUTH AWARDEES**

obago's successes at this year's National Youth Awards shows that efforts to develop the island's young people are paying off.

So says Julien Skeete, youth programme coordinator at the Division of Education, Youth Affairs and Sport (DEYAS).

Tobago submitted 60 nominations out 180 of participants, and picked up seven awards from 13 categories and Skeete said it validates the

Division's youth affairs mandate. "We're really seeking in every way possible to see how we can assist our young persons to realise that they can not only compete and stand out here at the level in Tobago," Julien said, "but therefore by virtue of what we teach them and how we encourage them to move forward, that they should realise that they can compete anywhere nationally, throughout the region, and even internationally."

Avron Ragdman won the award for agriculture, while Linton-Providence Orchid (Entrepreneurship) and Donneal Vincent (Health and Wellness) also won, along with Daniel Francis (Youth Activism), and Javier Forrester (Leadership Advocacy in the Community, Individual).

The North East Sea Turtle Group (Environment) and the Rotaract Club of Tobago (Leadership and Advocacy) won group awards.
